How and When Ready Rides Came to Be!

"Volunteers help sick, disabled get to medical appointments"

Ready Rides began with the tenacity of Coast (Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation) employee Jeff Donald, the hard work of a group of Strafford women, and the leadership of Northwood minister **Gayle Murphy**.

When Donald was hired by Coast in 2011, one of his projects was to foster the development of volunteer driving programs in the region, in particular addressing the issue of seniors needing transportation for health care. Filling that need would allow seniors to age in place.

Donald got to work, circling the areas on a map that would receive the greatest benefit—rural communities not on regional bus routes, where neighbors were few and contiguous towns could work together. He came up with Nottingham, Northwood, Barrington, and Strafford (the first to sign on). He called senior centers, community centers and churches. He met with small groups of people. He sent out emails trying to find the fine line between being persistent and being annoying. Donald saw himself as a technical assistant, someone to get the ball rolling to find active community members who would step up and start the program.

Eventually, he found just the right person to become the champion—**Rev. Gayle Murphy**, the minister of the Northwood Congregational Church. Gayle said, "It's clear to me that this was a need in our community."

Murphy made the phone calls that got the women to show up in force. "I do remember that the women themselves got others from Strafford involved as we moved along," said Murphy. While she may have provided the leadership, the Strafford women were the ones able to transform the dream into reality. They got to work on governance and outreach. They had funding from the Federal Transit Authority and, for insurance and nonprofit status, Murphy's church took Ready Rides on under its auspices. In February 2013, Carol Cooper, one of the Strafford women, gave the first ride. "You always get back more than you give," said Cooper. "I've met such nice, nice people."
